# **MU 120-QN: Music Appreciation - Spring 2023**

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**Course Objective:** This course aims to heighten your enjoyment and understanding of music by improving your listening skills, increasing your knowledge of music, and exposing you to new musical styles and forms. This course is intended for non-music and music majors; no prior musical experience is necessary for success in this class.

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**Course Overview:** Material will cover a variety of topics, musical styles, and artists organized thematically. The course emphasizes Western classical music but includes additional styles such as popular music and jazz.

**Course Format:** The course is organized in 14 units that each consists of music listening, video lectures, textbook reading, external links, and assignments. You will typically have one week to complete the material for each unit and 3 days to complete the quizzes and final.

**Evaluative Criteria:** There are five assignment types in this class, each described below. For all assignments, 8% is deducted each day an assignment is late. The breakdown of your final grade is as follows:

- 20% Quizzes
  20% Final Exam
  20% Concert Reports
  20% Assignments
  20% Reflections
  - Quizzes (20%): Quizzes (four total) will be listening-based and will include a
    variety of questions related to the material studied in class. You will have 75
    minutes and one attempt to complete each quiz.
  - **Final Exam (20%):** The final will be cumulative. You will have 120 minutes and one attempt to complete the final.
  - Concert Reports (20%): You must attend two live classical music concerts during the semester and submit concert reports for each. Guidelines for these reports as well as recommended concerts are available in the "Concert Report Information" module.
  - Assignments (20%) will consist of various activities aimed at guiding your listening experience and enhancing your understanding of the music. You are also expected to complete assigned reading and listen regularly and actively to all assigned music.
  - Reflections (20%): Students will be assigned randomly to a group of 6-9 people
    and will receive weekly questions based on course material. Each question will
    require a written response that will be visible to the other members of the
    group. Spelling and grammar DO count in reflection posts.

Grades fall in the standard distribution: A = 90 - 100, B = 80 - 89, C = 70 - 79, etc.

**Cheating**: Cheating includes many transgressions such as copying information from websites without proper citation, sharing answers with classmates, completing assignments with classmates, and lying on assignments. <u>Cheating will not be tolerated.</u> If you are found cheating, you will earn an "F" for the class and your name will be given to the UAB administration for further punishment that may lead to expulsion from school.
